

## Child Protection Policy and Procedure

1	<b>SUMMARY</b>	This policy demonstrates how the NHS Islington Clinical Commissioning Group (Islington CCG) meets its corporate accountability for safeguarding children. It provides guidance to NHS Islington CCG employees to enable them to fulfil their safeguarding children responsibilities. Provides guidance in the CCG's commissioning roles to drive continual improvement of services for children in terms of equity, effectiveness, safety, timeliness, efficiency and child centeredness.

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# **NHS Islington Clinical Commissioning Group Safeguarding Children Policy and Procedure**

## **1 Introduction**

- 1.1 NHS Islington Clinical Commissioning Group (Islington CCG) was established on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2013. This policy and procedure replaces the NHS North Central London Safeguarding Children policy which was current until 31<sup>st</sup> March 2013. It has been updated (December 2015) in line with new national guidance.
- 1.2 In accordance with Section 11 of the Children Act 2004, Islington CCG fully recognises its responsibility for protecting and safeguarding the welfare of children. We acknowledge our responsibility to take all reasonable steps to promote safe practice and to protect children from harm, abuse or exploitation and to work with service providers to continually drive up quality.
- 1.3 This policy and procedure applies to all employees and members of Islington CCG.
- 1.4 For the purposes of this document, as in the Children Acts 1989 and 2004, a child or young person is anyone who has not reached their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday
- 1.5 To comply with national safeguarding children requirements, Islington CCG commissioners have a duty to ensure that safeguarding is reflected within all partnership agreements. NHS Standard Contracts require providers to comply with the local Commissioner's Safeguarding Policies.
- 1.6 Islington CCG is accountable for its own safeguarding children structures and processes and is accountable for obtaining assurance re these arrangements in agencies from which they commission services.
- 1.7 Good safeguarding practice requires openness, transparency and trust. Islington CCG will comply with the legal "duty of candour" on health service bodies. This duty is to inform people (both in person and in writing) about mistakes or other incidents which have not produced the desired outcome, apologise where appropriate, and advise on any action taken as a result. Islington CCG will ensure that the services it commissions will comply with this legal requirement

## 2 Policy Aims

- 2.1. To demonstrate how Islington CCG meets its corporate accountability for safeguarding children.
- 2.2. To provide guidance to Islington CCG employees to enable them to fulfil their safeguarding children responsibilities.
- 2.3. The policy is specifically aimed at the continual improvement of services, through of equity, effectiveness, safety, timeliness, efficiency and child-centeredness.

## 3 Senior and strategic health leads

- 3.1 Islington CCG's Accountable Officer has responsibility for ensuring the contribution by health services to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is discharged effectively across the whole local health economy. This is operationally delivered through local commissioning arrangements. The Accountable Officer is a member of Islington CCG Governing Body.
- 3.2 The Director of Quality and Integrated Governance (Executive Lead for Safeguarding) reports to the Accountable Officer and is responsible for:
- Ensuring that the monitoring of safeguarding across commissioned health services in Islington takes place through the Quality and Performance committee of the NHS Islington CCG Board and the Q&A subgroup of the Islington Safeguarding Children Board (ISCB).
  - Reporting any appropriate safeguarding children risks or achievements to the Accountable Officer

- Drafting corporate media responses when required

3.3 Islington CCG has a public health responsibility to actively promote the health and well-being of all the children in Islington and this is executed through the Director of Public Health for Camden and Islington who is an observer member of Islington CCG Governing Body.

3.4 The Islington CCG Governing Body lead for Children's Services has specific responsibility for safeguarding children within her/his portfolio of responsibilities for commissioning services for the residents of Islington.

3.5 Islington CCG will comply with the legal requirements that board-level appointments of NHS trusts, foundation trusts and special health authorities are "fit and proper persons" ([Guidance for providers on meeting the regulations Health and Social Care Act 2008 \(Regulated Activities\) Regulations 2014 \(Part 3\) \(as amended\)](#)). This excludes individuals who have been involved in "any serious misconduct or mismanagement".

## 4 Designated Professionals

4.1 The terms "designated professionals" and "named professionals" denote professionals with specific roles and responsibilities for safeguarding children and for Children looked after, as defined in national statutory guidance "[Working together to Safeguard Children 2015: A guide to inter-agency working to safeguard and promote the welfare of children](#)".

4.2 Islington CCG is required to identify a senior paediatrician and senior nurse to undertake the role of designated professionals for safeguarding children. Islington CCG has retained the services of the Designated Nurse (directly employed) and Doctor for Child Protection (through a Service Level Agreement (SLA) with Whittington Health) in Islington. The job descriptions for designated professionals meet the standards and requirements outlined by the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health, and the Royal College of Nursing.

4.3 The Designated Nurse and Doctor for Child Protection provide a vital source of professional advice on safeguarding children matters to Islington CCG Governing

Body via the Executive Lead, Islington CCG Governing Body Children's Lead and to other professionals - particularly the named safeguarding health professionals in Provider Trusts, local authority children's services departments and the Islington Safeguarding Children Board (ISCB).

4.4 In discharging their responsibilities the designated professionals undertake the following functions:

- Provide advice to ensure the range of services commissioned and contracted by Islington CCG take account of the need to safeguard and promote the welfare of children, and to the monitoring of the safeguarding aspects of these contracts – See Appendix 1 for contact details.
- Play an integral role in all parts of the commissioning cycle, from procurement to quality assurance
- Are embedded in the clinical decision making of the CCG, with the authority to work within the local health economies to influence local thinking and practice.
- Provide advice on the monitoring of the safeguarding aspects of the contracts
- Provide advice, support and clinical supervision to the named professionals in each NHS provider organisation in Islington
- Provide skilled advice to the ISCB on health issues
- Play an important role in promoting, influencing and developing relevant training on both a single and inter-agency basis to ensure the training needs of health staff are addressed.
- Provide skilled professional involvement in child safeguarding processes in line with ISCB procedures and national guidance.
- Review and evaluate the practice and learning from all involved health professionals and providers commissioned by Islington CCG as part of Serious Case Reviews (SCR) and Serious Incidents (Sis) where there are safeguarding issues.

4.5 The Designated Nurse for Child Protection is professionally accountable to the Director of Quality & Integrated Governance / Islington CCG Board Nurse Member and the Designated Doctor for Child Protection is professionally accountable to the Islington CCG Clinical Director.

- 4.5.1 The term Designated Doctor or Nurse for Children looked after denotes professionals with specific roles and responsibilities for Children looked after including the provision of strategic advice and guidance to service planners and commissioning organisations. The commissioning aspect of the role of the Designated Doctor for Children looked after in Islington is delivered via an SLA between Islington CCG and their employer – currently Whittington Health. The responsibilities for the Designated Nurse for Children looked after transferred from Whittington Health to Islington CCG (March 2015), to the Designated Nurse for Child Protection.
- 4.6 The role of Designated Doctor for unexpected death in childhood is held by a consultant paediatrician whose role is “to provide advice on the commissioning of paediatric services from paediatricians with expertise in undertaking enquiries into unexpected deaths in childhood and the medical investigative services such as radiology, laboratory and histopathology services and the organisation of such services” ([Working together to safeguard children](#) , chapter 5). The commissioning aspects of the role of the Doctor for unexpected death in childhood in Islington are delivered via an SLA with their employer – currently Whittington Health
- 4.7 Designated professionals for Child Protection are performance managed by and accountable to the Director of Quality & Integrated Governance / Executive Lead for Safeguarding (Islington CCG) in relation to their designated functions. The Director of Quality & Integrated Governance has operational responsibility for safeguarding children as part of their portfolio of responsibilities.
- 4.8 Designated professionals should participate regularly in support / supervision groups or peer support networks for specialist professionals at a local, regional and national level according to professional guidelines. Attendance should be recorded and reviewed at their annual appraisals.

4.9 Islington CCG should ensure establishment levels of designated professionals are proportionate to the size and complexity of the local resident population and be assured that Provider trusts have appropriate numbers of Named professionals in post. Where the Trusts provide services outside of Islington, the Designated Professionals for Child Protection require assurance of what arrangements are in place.

4.9.1 Islington CCG supports the continued role of Named GP for Child Protection. The Named GP will have a key role in promoting good professional practice within their organisation (in this case, Primary Care General Practitioner Services), providing advice and expertise for fellow professionals, contributing to single and multi-agency child safeguarding audits, sharing information and good practice including feedback from SCRs and provision of training.

4.9.2 Co-commissioning arrangements were introduced in April 2015 when the commissioning of the Named GP for 2 sessions per week transferred from NHS E (London) to the CCG, to provide an opportunity to bring together quality aspects of safeguarding in GP practices into a single assurance process

## 5 Commissioning

5.1 Islington CCG will work with London Borough of Islington and other local CCGs to commission and ensure co-ordinated and integrated services. Service specifications drawn up by Islington CCG should include clear service standards for safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children, consistent with the ISCB procedures. National contracts provide the means to prescribe the requirements for safeguarding children. By monitoring the service standards of all providers, Islington CCG will need to assure itself that the required safeguarding standards are being met in Islington.

5.1.1 Islington CCG should ensure that all providers from whom they commission services have comprehensive and effective single and multi-agency policies and procedures to safeguard and promote the welfare of children, consistent with current London Child Protection Procedures, including, but not exclusively e.g. PREVENT, which sets out the government's commitment to understand factors which encourage people to support terrorism and then to engage in terrorism-

related activity, Female Genital Mutilation (FGM), and Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) see links to key documents at references (page 18).

- 5.2 The Joint Strategic Needs Assessment for Islington should include health and well-being needs of all local children, and as such should inform the Islington Children and Families Strategy and the Health and Wellbeing Board Strategy, which in turn inform the ISCB business plan. When considering commissioning services for the health and wellbeing of children in need in their area, Islington CCG should ensure this includes those who are temporarily resident in the area, which includes children held in secure settings.
- 5.3 Islington CCG will ensure that safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is integral to the quality and safety of all providers and commissioning services, and that there is evidence of robust audit arrangements. This will be reported to the ISCB, Islington CCG Child Protection Committee and Islington CCG Quality and Performance Group.
- 5.4 Islington CCG will monitor the service standards of NHS Foundation Trusts and contracted service providers to ensure service providers meet the required safeguarding children standards. This will occur through the Clinical Quality Review Group (CQRG) meetings with each provider.
- 5.5 Islington Clinical Commissioning Group should seek assurance that primary care provision has robust systems and practices in place to ensure they can fulfil their role in safeguarding and promote the welfare of children.
- 5.6 Islington CCG is responsible for commissioning and monitoring the quality of child safeguarding arrangements in GP Out-Of-Hours (OOH) services, Walk-in Centres and Urgent Care Centre provision in Islington. Staff working within these services should know how to access child protection advice from relevant designated and named professionals.
- 5.7 Islington CCG will ensure that local providers are aware of the local Sexual Assault Referral Services (SARS) care pathway for children and young people as commissioned by the NHS England. All SARS for children and young people,

including services provided through Sexual Assault Referral Centres (SARCs), should comply with the standards for paediatric forensic medical services. Islington CCG should ensure that relevant CCG staff and provider staff are clear about the different agencies' roles and responsibilities, so that they are not hesitant about responding appropriately. See London Child Protection Procedures sec.2.11 for more information.

- 5.8 Islington CCG will seek assurance that relevant partner agencies have easy access to paediatricians trained in examining, identifying and assessing children who may be experiencing abuse or neglect, and that local arrangements include having all the necessary equipment and staff expertise for undertaking forensic medical examinations. These arrangements should avoid repeated examinations.
- 5.9 Through their contracting arrangements, Islington CCG should ensure that independent and third sector providers deliver services that are in line with Borough level obligation and should ensure they apply the same standards and requirements as for NHS providers with respect to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children.
- 5.10 Islington CCG will require assurance of the quality of child safeguarding arrangements in place in HM Prisons in Islington in conjunction with the commissioning responsibilities of NHS England.

## 6 Serious case reviews

- 6.1 Islington CCG is responsible for co-ordinating the health component of serious case reviews (SCRs) via Designated Professionals, following current national and local guidance ( see 1.7).
- 6.2 Islington CCG should ensure that NHS England (London) and the Care Quality Commission (CQC) are notified of all SCRs, and with the involvement of the Communications and Governance team, will agree any responses to media interest.
- 6.3 All SCRs must be notified to the Executive Lead for Safeguarding Children (Director of Quality and Integrated Governance), Islington CCG's Accountable Officer and the chair of Islington CCG.

- 6.4 The designated professionals will inform the Patient Safety Manager (Commissioning Support Unit) of all potential and agreed Serious Case reviews to ensure completion of initial notification to NHS England on the Strategic Executive Information System (STEIS) and provide them with regular updates.
- 6.5 The Director for Quality & Integrated Governance/Executive Lead for Safeguarding and / or Accountable Officer for Islington CCG will oversee and sign off Health Overview Reports for SCR's written by the designated Nurse and Doctor for child protection for Islington Clinical Commissioning Group. NHS England will sign-off Primary Care Individual Management Reviews (IMRs).
- 6.6 Islington CCG Child Protection committee will monitor the implementation of any actions arising from an IMR or SCR, and will provide regular reports to the CCG Governing body. The Designated Nurse and Doctor will provide advice to the Committee and quality assure provider services IMRs.
- 6.7 IMRs written for Health Providers are signed off by the respective Executive Lead for Safeguarding Children in the Provider Trust and **not** Islington CCG.
- 6.8 Health organisations are required to participate in Domestic Homicide Reviews as requested by the Community Safety Partnership. DHRs that Islington CCG contribute to will be managed in the same way as other reviews and notified to the Executive Lead for Safeguarding (Director of Quality and Integrated Governance) and Islington CCG's Accountable Officer.

## 7 Training requirements

- 7.1.1 Safeguarding Children Training is a mandatory requirement for all staff employed by Islington CCG. Details about availability of and access to required levels of training can be found in the ICCG Essential Skills training policy on the ICCG intranet.
- 7.1.2 The competences specifically needed by healthcare workers to promote children's safety within the healthcare system are described in [https://secure.toolkitfiles.co.uk/clients/22965/sitedata/files/Safeguarding\\_Children\\_Health.pdf](https://secure.toolkitfiles.co.uk/clients/22965/sitedata/files/Safeguarding_Children_Health.pdf) Islington CCG staff are also required to have an understanding of

PREVENT (see 5.1.1 above), included in OLM e-learning safeguarding children training.

7.1.3 Safeguarding competences are the set of abilities that enable staff to effectively safeguard, protect and promote the welfare of children and young people. They are a combination of skills, knowledge, attitudes and values that are required for safe and effective practice.

7.1.4 Different staff groups require different levels of competence, depending on their role and degree of contact with children, young people and families, the nature of their work, and their level of responsibility.

7.1.5 The Intercollegiate Document identifies six levels of competence, and gives examples of groups that fall within each of these. The levels are as follows:

- Level 1: Non-clinical staff working in health care settings.
- Level 2: Minimum level required for clinical staff who have some degree of contact with children and young people and/or parents/carers.
- Level 3: Clinical staff working with children, young people and/or their parents/carers and who could potentially contribute to assessing, planning, intervening and evaluating the needs of a child or young person and parenting capacity where there are safeguarding/child protection concerns.
- Level 4: Named professionals
- Level 5: Designated professionals
- Level 6: Experts

7.1.6 Staff should consult with their line managers to identify which level of competence they require referring to the Intercollegiate Guidance above.

7.1.7 **Monitoring of Training:** Essential Skills training (which includes child safeguarding training) for Islington CCG staff will be managed and monitored through the North and East London Commissioning Support Unit (NELCSU). NELCSU provides a monthly workforce report which includes uptake of Essential skills training and is reported to and monitored quarterly by Islington CCG's Child protection committee.

## 8 NHS Islington CCG Board Assurance

- 8.1 *NHS organisations – whether as commissioners or providers of NHS funded care- must demonstrate strong local leadership, work as committed partners and invest in effective co-ordination and robust quality assurance of safeguarding arrangements. (Safeguarding Vulnerable People in the NHS - 2015).*
- 8.2 The Child Safeguarding responsibilities and priorities of Islington CCG will be co-ordinated through Islington CCG's Child Protection Committee which is chaired by Islington CCG's lead for Children's Services and Child Safeguarding, and reports to the Quality and Performance committee. See Appendix 2 for structure charts.
- 8.3 To evidence compliance with safeguarding requirements, Islington CCG will receive an Annual Safeguarding Children Report, a 6 monthly update and other reports by exception.
- 8.4 Monthly reports on key Child Safeguarding metrics will be included in Islington CCG's integrated performance report.
- 8.5 The implementation of action plans arising from inspections of Child Safeguarding and Children Looked After services will be monitored via Islington's CCG child protection committee.
- 8.6 The Patient Safety Manager within the Commissioning Support Unit will be updated on any open Serious Incidents (SI). Any SI with a safeguarding or child protection element will be sent to the Designated Nurse for Child Protection and reported to Islington CCG's Child Protection Committee.
- 8.7 The Designated Professionals for Child Protection will ensure that NHS Islington Clinical Commissioning Group is represented on each NHS Provider organisations internal safeguarding children Committee to enable assurance with regard to internal monitoring standards. It will also enable the constructive challenge and appropriate safeguarding support to each organisation.
- 8.8 The designated professionals will attend the CQRGs for each provider Trust when child safeguarding is on the agenda

## 9 Islington Safeguarding Children Board

- 9.1 The Children Act 2004 Section 13 requires NHS Trusts to cooperate and engage fully with partner agencies as competent members of their Local Safeguarding Children's Board (LSCB).
- 9.2 Islington CCG must co-operate with the local authority in the operation of the ISCB and, as partners, must share responsibility for the effective discharge of its functions in safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children.
- 9.3 Representation on the Board should be at an appropriate level of seniority. Islington CCG will be represented by the Accountable Officer together with the Designated Nurse and Doctor who will also attend sub-groups of the ISCB.
- 9.4 Islington CCG Child protection committee members receive the Minutes of the ISCB meetings and feedback from the designated professionals is included as a standing agenda item.
- 9.5 Islington CCG is responsible for providing and/or ensuring the availability of appropriate Islington CCG expertise, advice and support to the ISCB, in respect of a range of specialist health functions, e.g. primary care, mental health (adult, adolescent and child) and sexual health.
- 9.6 The designated professionals will represent Islington CCG on the ISCB SCR sub-group and on behalf of the CCG are responsible for coordinating the health component of serious case reviews and for writing the Health Overview report.
- 9.7 Islington CCG must ensure that all health organisations, including the third sector, independent healthcare sector and social enterprises with which it has commissioning arrangements, have links with a specific LSCB, and that health agencies work in partnership and accordance with their agreed LSCB plan. This is particularly important where Trusts' boundaries/catchment areas are different from those of LSCB's.
- 9.8 In accordance with the expectations for partner members of ISCB, NHS Islington CCG will undertake a 2 yearly audit of its compliance with Section 11 of the

Children Act and will require evidence that all commissioned health services also undertake a 2 yearly Section 11 audit. Any resulting action plans will be monitored through the ISCB QA sub-group and Islington CCG Child Protection Committee will regularly review Islington CCG's Section 11 action plan.

## **10 . Employment Practice( including allegations against staff)**

- 10.1 Islington CCG will have in place safe recruitment policies and practices for all staff, and will require evidence of such arrangements from all provider Trusts and other commissioned services. N.b. In the event of any uncertainty about which policy staff should follow or how to apply it, they should contact either their line-manager or the Director of Quality and Integrated Governance( Executive lead for safeguarding)  
See Islington CCG guidance: Managing allegations against staff in relation to child safeguarding (July 2014) and related documents: Whistle blowing policy & Conduct and capability policy.
- 10.2 Islington CCG will have procedures in place to respond to any allegations made against staff working with children and young people in accordance with Working Together to Safeguard Children 2015 and the London Child Protection Procedures, and will require evidence of such arrangements for all provider Trusts and other commissioned services. This includes the requirement for all employing organisations to have a named senior officer responsibility for dealing with allegations and informing the relevant Local Authority Designated Officer (LADO) of all such cases
- 10.3 Any allegations made against independent contractors should be reported to the Islington LADO, the NHS England (London) Medical Director and lead for practitioner performance and the Director for Quality & Integrated Governance for NHS Islington CCG, who in turn will inform the designated professionals.


